Liquid clay is called slip. **Style:** Pottery Pottery: Objects shaped from moist clay and hardened by heat. Media: Ceramics **Modelling:** Working clay into a shape or form. Period: Neoclassicism Scoring: Cutting or scratching the surface, used to join parts of a pot e.g. a handle. **Firing:** Applying heat to harden clay in a large oven called a kiln. Glaze: A coating of coloured liquid glass applied to ceramics Name: Chris Barnes between firing. Pinching: Squeezing between the thumb and a Country of Birth: London finger Style: Potterv • Thrown vessels: Any ceramics where a kick or electric wheel is Media: Ceramics used to produce the arts work. **Period:** Contemporary Wedging & Kneading: Squeezing or pressing together using the hands & fingers. Hollowing: Removing the inside of a solid.





The **Della Robbia Pottery** was a ceramic factory founded in 1894 in Birkenhead. It closed in 1906. It made ornamental vessels plates, intended for display rather than use.
